

The Directory of U.S. Newspapers in American Libraries is a searchable index of newspapers published in the United States since 1690. This directory can help identify what titles exist for a specific place and time, and how to access them. **The Library of Congress does not hold all titles included in this Directory.** For a detailed overview of the Directory, search tips, and FAQs, please consult the Directory of U.S. Newspapers in American Libraries: A Guide for Researchers.

Previously known as the United States Newspaper Directory and included in the Chronicling America: Historic American Newspaper online collection, the Directory of U.S. Newspapers in American Libraries online collection is derived from the library catalog records primarily created by state institutions during the United States Newspaper Program (USNP), 1982-2011. The USNP was funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) and supported by the Library of Congress to sponsor state-level projects to locate, describe (catalog), and selectively preserve (via treatment and microfilm) historic newspapers in every state, published from 1690 to the present. Under this program, each institution created machine-readable cataloging (MARC) via the Cooperative ONline SERials Program (CONSER) for its state collections, contributing approximately 140,000 bibliographic descriptions and 600,000 library holdings records to the Newspaper Union List, hosted by the Online Computer Library Center (OCLC). These data were eventually combined with other databases into the global WorldCat cooperative database. While the data in the Directory of U.S. Newspapers in American Libraries mirrors what is also available in OCLC WorldCat, the directory provides an alternate interface to this information, tailored to searching newspaper records and available as its own dataset.

While the USNP is no longer an active program, the Library of Congress continues to update the Directory of U.S. Newspapers in American Libraries on a regular basis in order to include any changes made to the newspaper records. The Library of Congress periodically harvests all CONSER-authenticated U.S. newspaper records from the WorldCat service using the Open WorldCat API (Application Programming Interface) and, where possible, matches them up with USNP-created library holdings information also held separately by OCLC.












About American Lancaster Gazette (Lancaster, Ohio) 1855-1860

The Lancaster Gazette was established by George Sanderson and Benjamin Oswald on April 4, 1826, in Lancaster, the seat of Fairfield County, Ohio. It was the organ of the Whig Party and competed directly with the Democratic Ohio Eagle, which was the county's first paper, having published its first issue in 1807. Fairfield County was predominantly Democratic, and despite its minority political affiliation, and the number of changes in ownership, editorship, and name that the Gazette would experience over the next century, the weekly publication gradually increased in both size and popularity. Eventually, it achieved circulation numbers that surpassed all but a few of Ohio's county papers.

In 1852, under the leadership of George Weaver, the paper became known as the Weekly Lancaster Gazette. The Gazette supported the Know-Nothing or American Party for a short time starting in 1855, changing its name to the American Lancaster Gazette. The new masthead incorporated a portrait of President George Washington and included one of his quotes as a motto: "Place None but Americans on Guard." After the 1856 Republican National Convention, the paper began to support the Republican Party. In 1859, Robert M. Clarke and John M. Sutphen took over the paper and a new motto appeared across the masthead: "When the Press

Compromises Truth, it Ceases to be the Guardian of Liberty." Their salutatory address stated that "With whatever force we may muster, we shall engage the Democratic party—strike at its corruptions—lay bear (sic) its errors and expose its utter destitution of principle." The Gazette was opposed the extension of slavery but did not advocate for racial equality.

In 1860, Dr. Hervey Scott purchased the *Gozette* and another paper by the name of the *American Democrat*, merging them to form the *Gazette and Democrat*. Its motto was "The Union of the States—One Country—One Destiny." He soon sold the paper back to Clarke and Sutphen, who were joined by William H. Kooken. They changed the name of the publication to the *Weekly Lancaster Gazette*. By 1863, Clarke's interest had been purchased by A.P. Miller and the paper dropped "weekly" from its title to become the *Lancaster Gazette* once again. During the Civil War, the *Gazette* was the "uncompromising advocate of the Union" and supported all efforts by the national government to suppress the rebellion. Many of its pages were devoted to state and national political news, but the *Gazette* also printed poetry and items of local interest, including marriage and death announcements, court bulletins, agricultural information, business news, and advertisements. In 1936, the *Lancaster Gazette* merged with the *Lancaster Daily Eagle* to form the *Lancaster Eagle-Gazette* which still serves Lancaster and Fairfield County today.

Genealogy Tips for Newspapers

- Important dates and locations birth, marriage, death
- Limit searches to the time and place a person would likely live
 - Particularly for common last names
- Modern day newspapers different than older newspapers.
 - Death notices/obituaries aren't always in a separate section
- Why would this person be in a newspaper?
 - Sensational accident or crime
 - Scandal or gossip
 - Involved in politics or community organization





Genealogy Tips for Newspapers

- Local notices column
- Name variations
 - Initials
 - Mr/Mrs/Miss/Messrs
 - Titles Dr. and Judge, Capt., Col, Lt., Master, Sheriff, Mayor, Rev., etc.
 - Married women referred to by husband's name
 - First name of children not mentioned at all
- Check for common misspellings
- Check the site every other year or so for new results

Teaching with Primary Sources: Newspaper Title Essays

The Broad Ax

Throughout its history, the *Broad Ax* (Salt Lake City and Chicago) was issued weekly by its founder, publisher, and editor, Julius F. Taylor (1853-1934). Born into slavery near New Market, Virginia, Julius Taylor was the 13th of 14 children of Gilbert and Mary Ann Taylor. Taylor's parents and older siblings had earlier been sold to different owners but remained in relatively close proximity in the Shenandoah Valley. In the mid-1860s Taylor made his way to Philadelphia and settled successively in St. Paul, Minnesota; Fargo, North Dakota; and Chicago, before arriving in Salt Lake City in 1895. There Taylor founded the *Broad Ax*, which joined two other black newspapers published in Salt Lake City at a time when there were fewer than 1,000 African Americans in the state.

The first issue, published on August 31, 1895, carries the motto that remained with the paper until it ceased in 1931: "Hew to the line." Taylor announced that his paper would be "Democratic in politics, advocating the immortal principles of Jefferson and Jackson." He advocated racial equality, religious tolerance, and support for Free Silver (and, later William Jennings Bryan). As one scholar observed, "a sharp-tongued, Democratic, atheistic, African American editor in Utah in the 1890s stood out as an anomaly" (Michael S. Sweeney,





General Tips for Newspapers

Establish context

- Newspaper articles came from a particular time and space in history
- Consider what was happening during that time and if any of that could relate to the newspaper article, potential bias, or how people/events were portrayed.
- Check for newspapers written for and by various ethnic or labor groups involved in the stories being covered.

Read articles that ran several days after the event happened

- After in-the-moment events happen, more information becomes available
- Seek articles from different Newspaper Titles/Publishers

Check the newspaper's title essay

- Most newspapers in Chronicling America have a title essay.
- Essay provides valuable context into the publisher and audience for the newspaper.
